



The 2016 California Election: Lessons Learned and Continuing Challenges

Voter turnout in California's 2016 general election was relatively robust compared to other recent elections. But to what extent were these voters representative of our state's population? In this election cycle, perhaps more than ever before, media, advocates and pundits discussed the importance of turnout, in particular for Latinos and young people in California. Would the many people registered during the divisive campaign actually cast their ballots in large numbers?

Dr. Mindy Romero, Director of the California Civic Engagement Project (CCEP), will present a CCEP analysis of 2016 voter data, diving deep into statewide participation by race/ethnicity, age and geography. She will discuss lessons to be learned from the 2016 election and share insights related to achieving the goal of a fully representative California electorate.
